05.12.1919:	Ran trials.
08.12.1919:	Delivered as <i>Eston</i> for The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company. Eston is a town on Tees-side in northeast England.
26.01.1940:	Sailed from Hull for Blyth and disappeared. She was reported off Blyth two days later and is presumed to have struck a mine the same day. One boat was washed ashore on 29 th January 1940 and another, and the body of a seaman, the next day. No other traces of the vessel were found.

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
