Career

04.11.1912: 19.09.1913:	Ordered. Launched.
07.01.1914: ?:	Delivered as <i>Khiva</i> for The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company. Khiva is a town in Uzbekistan, an important point on trade routes from Russia to Afghanistan and India.
03.1917:	Maiden sailing UK/China and Japan. Requisitioned. She had four narrow escapes from submarines in 1917-18, being missed twice, running away once and repelling her attacker with gunfire once.
01.1919:	One of first P&O ships released by Government, running London/Bombay.
04.1920:	Fire on board while in Singapore, followed by temporary repairs.
1921:	Overhauled in London and then in Portsmouth Dockyard to avoid a joiners' strike. Returned to Far East run.
20.04.1927:	Stranded near Steep Island, 160km (100 miles) south of Shanghai, when on a voyage from Rotterdam to Yokohama with general cargo. Refloated with considerable damage, repaired and returned to service.
03.1929:	Rescued the crew of the Norddeutscher Lloyd liner <i>Giessen</i> , wrecked 12 th March on Saddle Island off the mouth of the Yangtze.
02.1931:	Extensively damaged by fire when off Dairen, China, and put into port with her main deck completely gutted. After temporary repairs returned to London.
14.04.1931:	Arrived in London. After examination she was declared a constructive total loss.
05.05.1931:	Sold for £15,500 through Samuel Hodge and Co Ltd, London to Japanese shipbreakers.
06.09.1931: 11.1931:	Sailed for Japan. Delivered.

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
