24.06.1913:	Delivered as <i>Manora</i> for British India Steam Navigation Company at a cost of £118,100. She was the second of the M-class ships to be delivered along with her sisters <i>Malda, Mashobra, Mongara,</i>
	Morvada, Merkara, Mandala, Mantola and Margha.
24.06.1914:	Takeover of British India Steam Navigation Company by The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company agreed.
09.1914:	Participated in the convoy from Bombay to Marseilles.
04.1917:	Came under the Liner Requisition Scheme.
17.05.1918:	Grounded in heavy fog on Torcor Head off Rathlin Island outward bound for Montreal.
31.05.1918:	Was able to be refloated through the aid of a destroyer churning up wash when passing her at high speed.
1919:	Following the completion of repairs, she was also refitted to carry 16 Cadets. Passenger capacity now 69 one class.
02.1919:	Fouled her port propeller on the West Oaze Buoy and had to
	complete the journey back to London on the other screw.
13.04.1921:	Had a minor fire at London.
06.11.1922:	Her steering gear broke down on leaving Alexandria and she was forced to return to port with tug assistance.
14.12.1924:	Collided with the Dutch vessel <i>Amstelland</i> while she was anchored in Anstraweel Roads, Antwerp. The latter was also struck by the French steamer <i>Desirade</i> .
