21.10.1949:	Launched.
29.01.1950:	Delivered as Mombasa for the British India Steam Navigation
	Company.
16.09.1951:	The Mombasa lay alongside Kilindini harbour together with six other
	BI ships, occupying every available berth, to welcome the new
	Kenya on her maiden voyage. This became known a 'BI Sunday'.
15.09.1953:	With the Governor of Tangyanika, Sir Edward Twining, on board she
	was the first commercial vessel to come alongside the newly-
	constructed deep water wharf at Mtwara, which became her
	southern terminal.
18.08.1960:	Made her final BI scheduled arrival at Mombasa and was almost
	immediately despatched to a berth at Port Reitz where she was laid
	up pending sale.
18.10.1961:	Sold for £130,000 to Crescent Shipping Lines Ltd, Karachi, and
	renamed Kareem. During her 10 years on the East African coast,
	she carried 200,000 passengers and 250,000 tons of cargo.
14.04.1968:	Broken up at Karachi.
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
