Career

27.05.1880:	Launched.
01.08.1880:	Registered.
29.08.1880:	Delivered as <i>Rosetta</i> for The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company. The first P&O ship built in Ireland.
08.09.1880:	Maiden sailing Southampton/Australia, then briefly Sydney/Bombay.
1881/1889:	London/Australia service. Later Far East service.
1885:	Taken up at Hong Kong for use as an armed merchant cruiser during a period of diplomatic tension with Russia. (<i>Massilia</i> was similarly taken up at Sydney). Fitted with two 64-pounder, two 40-pounder and one 20-pounder gun, but it was widely believed that her decks would have been unable to withstand the shock of them firing. Returned to P&O service without seeing any action.
20.11.1898:	En route Nagasaki to Kobe when collided with 'schooner junk' <i>Sunya Maru</i> which was not carrying lights. All her crew were picked up but the Japanese ship broke up when a tow was attempted.
10.1900:	Sold for £10,789 to Asano Soichiro, Japan. Resold to Nippon Yusen Kabushiki Kaisha, Japan and renamed <i>Rosetta Maru</i> .
1901:	Sold to Toyo Kisen Kabushiki Kaisha, Japan.
1905:	Sold to Ojiro Kisen Kabushiki Kaisha, Japan.
07.1907:	Sold to Japanese shipbreakers.

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
