23.08.1883:	Launched by Mrs William Pearce, wife of the Chairman of her builders.
17.10.1883:	Ran trials.
27.12.1883:	Registered at Lyttelton as <i>Tongariro</i> for New Zealand Shipping Company Ltd at a cost of £140,900. She was New Zealand Shipping Company's first steamship, one of five built for the monthly mail and passenger service, she had a clipper stern and barque rig. Her name, taken from an extinct volcano in North Island, New Zealand means 'carried away on the South Wind'.
25.10.1884:	Maiden voyage London/Plymouth (sailed 29 th)/Cape Town/Port Chalmers/Lyttelton/Wellington/Auckland returning to London via Montevideo/Rio/Tenerife/Plymouth.
14.09.1888:	Registry transferred to London.
05.10.1894:	Rammed Franklin Wharf, Hobart without damage.
02.06.1895:	Put into Spithead with engine problems outward bound for London.
09.12.1897:	Last voyage on New Zealand service.
04.1898:	Laid up.
08.1898:	Chartered to Beaver Line for service between Liverpool and Montreal.
23.09.1899:	Sold to British India Steam Navigation Company and renamed Zibenghla. She carried 20 first class passengers.
1899:	Transport No.8 during the Boer War.
1900:	Transport to the Boxer campaign in China.
1901:	Madras/Negapatam/Rangoon service.
1905/1906:	Calcutta/Rangoon/Hong Kong/Amoy service.
1907:	Three pilgrim voyages to Jeddah.
28.04.1910:	Sold to Bombay shipbreakers for Rs 104,000.
06.1910:	Demolition began.
