Launched.
Delivered as <i>Chyebassa</i> for British India Steam Navigation Company at a cost of £76,300. She was the last of the new C-class ships to be delivered with her sisters being <i>Canara</i> , <i>Colaba</i> , <i>Chanda</i> , <i>Chupra and Culna</i> .
Takeover of British India Steam Navigation Company by The
Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company agreed.
Taken up as an Expeditionary Force transport. Her crew had to be replaced in London after the Indian crew refused further duty.
Transported 1/5 London Rgt (London Rifle Brigade) from
Southampton to Havre.
Released from transport duty.
Came under the Liner Requisition Scheme.
Torpedoed by UC25 when she was 32km (20 miles) south of Malta while leading the second column of a four-column convoy. She then collided with the <i>City of Marseilles</i> . The boats carried away most of the crew until it was apparent that <i>Chyebassa</i> was not going to sink. She was reboarded and brought slowly into Marsa Scirocco and beached for repairs.
Struck and sank the mine-sweeping trawler <i>Adrian</i> in fog off Orfordness.
Sold for £11,500 to Italian shipbreakers at Antwerp. Broken up in Italy.

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
