12.1914:	Launched. Originally laid down as <i>Cornwall</i> (she actually appears under that name in the 1914 edition of Lloyd's Register).
02.06.1915:	Left the yard in tow to London where she was completed by Silley, Weir & Co Ltd. It was decided to move her to a UK yard due to the advancement of the German army through Belgium and Northern France.
01.11.1915:	Registered.
07.09.1916:	Takeover of the New Zealand Shipping Company (including its subsidiary Federal Steam Navigation Company) by The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company agreed.
14.11.1916:	Collided with the steamer A1 in the Bristol Channel.
13.12.1916/	Requisitioned as an Expeditionary Force transport.
04.07.1917:	
05.07.1917/	Came under the Liner Requisition Scheme.
24.03.1919:	
29.05.1922:	Suffered a bunker fire at Lyttelton.
15.03.1924:	Arrived at Napier after having lost half her rudder and proceeded to Auckland for docking.
1926:	Stood by the New Zealand Shipping Company's <i>Paparoa</i> when she caught fire in the South Atlantic. Her passengers being taken off by P&O's <i>Barrabool</i> .
18.05.1926:	Towed the disabled American steamer <i>Eastern Moon</i> 710km (440 miles) from off Elizabeth Reef to Sydney when the latter lost her propeller in heavy weather.
13.01.1927:	While lying in the stream at Wellington, the hulk <i>Arawata</i> coming alongside to bunker her, bumped heavily on the <i>Devon</i> and had to be beached in a sinking condition.
1927/1933:	Served as a cadet ship for 20 cadets. At the conclusion of her service in this capacity, her cadets were transferred to the <i>Northumberland</i> .
07.05.1929:	Suffered a fire in the bunkers at Port Chalmers.
08.1933/	Laid up at Truro.
03.1934:	
28.08.1934:	Sold for £10,000 to the British India Steam Navigation Company Ltd of London.
09.1934/	Served as a cadet ship for 38 cadets, taking those persons who were
08.1939:	removed from the Nerbudda.
02.04.1940:	Requisitioned for the Liner Division.
19.08.1941:	Sunk by the raider <i>Komet</i> masquerading as the Japanese (then neutral) <i>Royoku Maru</i> 320km (200 miles) south-west of the Galapagos Islands (04'08'S-92'23'W), bound Newcastl e to New Zealand. 144 crew and passengers were taken off the ship and taken prisoner. Her crew spent the rest of the War in German prisoner-of-war camps.

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
