10.02.1914:	Launched as <i>Gyula</i> for Societe Francaise d'Armement et de Transport, France.
21.01.1915:	Purchased for £18,000 by The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company and renamed <i>Frodingham</i> after a town in Lincolnshire just south of Scunthorpe.
29.07.1916:	Bombed by German aircraft off Bridlington but not damaged.
17.05.1923:	Sold for £16,750 to Neville Shipping Co Ltd (F H Green & Co, managers), Cardiff, and renamed <i>Neville</i> .
01.04.1927:	Foundered off the Runnelstone Buoy, 6.5km (4 miles) south-east by south from Tolpeda, Cornwall, when her cargo of coal shifted. She was on a voyage from Barry to Rouen. Her crew were picked up by <i>Teelin Head</i> and landed at Plymouth.

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
