07.05.1898: 27.06.1898:	Launched. Handed over as <i>Mapourika</i> for Union Steam Ship Company of New
	Zealand at a cost of £34,553. She was designed for the Wellington/ Nelson/Westport/Greymouth service.
01.10.1898:	Went ashore on the seaward side of the North Tiphead at
	Greymouth. In order to salvage the vessel it was necessary to
	virtually slide her over the breakwater and re-launch her into the
	river. Nearly 100 men spent 4 months in preparation and she was
	successfully re-launched 10 March 1899.
12.1899:	Transferred to the Wellington/Lyttelton service.
23.08.1900:	Ran aground off Picton.
28.04.1901:	Suffered damage off Pencarrow.
02.01.1902:	Stranded in the French Pass.
17.01.1904:	Grounded at Nelson.
03.12.1904:	Once again, she stranded off Nelson.
06.11.1905:	Ran aground at Shag Port Otago.
11.08.1906:	Grounded at Nelson.
19.06.1908:	Involved in a collision with the <i>Ingrid</i> at Westport.
11.03.1911:	Collided with the Pateena at Nelson.
30.08.1916:	Suffered a leak while she was in Blind Bay.
01.07.1917:	Takeover of the Union Steam Ship Company of New Zealand by The
1010	Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company agreed.
1918:	Transferred to the Wellington/Picton/Nelson service.
1921:	Sold to the Anchor Shipping & Foundry Ltd (another P&O subsidiary
	and thus she did not leave P&O Group service). She was renamed
	Ngaio for the Nelson/Wellington overnight service and registered at Nelson.
1924:	Re-measured. Now 725 nrt.
1924. 1927:	Re-measured. Now 712 nrt.
01.08.1930:	Struck the quay at Wellington.
1935:	Out of service.
1936:	Broken up at Nelson by Jackson & Co.
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
