04.1911: Ordered. 18.05.1912: Launched.

02.07.1912: Registered and delivered as *Nankin* for The Peninsular and Oriental

Steam Navigation Company. The first of the second batch of 'N' class intermediate steamers for the China Line: *Nile, Namur, Nyanza* (all 1906) and *Nore* (1907) made up the first group; *Nankin, Novara*

(1912), Nagoya and Nellore (both 1913) completed the set.

12.07.1912: Sailed from Greenock.

1917: Missed by a torpedo in the Channel.

1919: Caught fire while in Devonport with a cargo of ammunition.

14.09.1931: Sold for £27,000 to Eastern and Australian Steam Ship Co. Ltd.,

London for their Australia/Japan service. (E&A was not at that time a

P&O subsidiary although it became one in 1946).

10.05.1942: Captured by the German raider *Thor* in the Indian Ocean, West of

Australia in position 26°43'S-89°56'E, after being shelled by *Thor* and machine-gunned by its seaplane. *Nankin* was carrying 180 crew and 162 passengers and was bound from Fremantle to Colombo, but the prisoners were taken aboard *Thor* and replaced by a prize crew, and all sailed to Yokohama. There she was renamed *Leuthen* and

conversion to a naval supply ship was commenced.

20.11.1942: Destroyed by fire and explosion when the tanker *Uckermark*

exploded during bunkering, possibly due to sabotage by Norwegian

prisoners-of-war.

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
