	£123,900.
12.11.1908:	First registered at Plymouth to G T Haycraft and T R Westray.
27.10.1909:	Arrived at London with a fire in No. 3 hold.
14.03.1910:	Ownership transferred to New Zealand Shipping Company Ltd.
11.11.1911:	Grounded in the Thames outward bound. Rammed by the steamer
	Bitinia while aground and returned to Tilbury for repairs.
20.07.1915:	Stood by P&O Branch Line emigrant steamer Benalla on fire
	1,300km (800 miles) east of Durban.
23.09.1915:	Suffered a fire in bunkers at Auckland.
30.05.1916:	Made the first New Zealand Shipping Company transit of the
	Panama Canal, bound Wellington to London.
07.09.1916:	New Zealand Shipping Company taken over by The Peninsular and
	Oriental Steam Navigation Company. This did not alter Otaki's
	ownership, management or operation.
10.03.1917:	Sighted a vessel at 1430hrs that proved to be the German
	commerce raider <i>Moewe</i> . The <i>Otaki</i> was eventually sunk by gunfire
	and torpedoes from the Moewe 690km (420 miles) west by south of
	Lisbon, bound London to New York and New Zealand in ballast. The
	Master and 5 of the crew were lost; Captain A B Smith was
	posthumously gazetted in the Royal Naval Reserve so that he could
	be awarded the Victoria Cross for his part in the action.

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
