01.1952: 06.17.1955: 25.06.1956: 15.11.1956:	Ordered. Keel laid. Launched by Mrs W M L Escombe. Ran trials and delivered as <i>Salmara</i> for The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company. Salmara is the name of a place in Assam.	
02.1964:	Carried 150 tons of scrap metal from London to Hong Kong, most of which came from the recently demolished P&O building in Leadenhall Street.	
12.09.1966:	Ownership, management and operation transferred to Eastern and Australian Steam Ship Company and renamed <i>Arakawa</i> . E&A was in need of greater cargo capacity to respond to the growth of exports of manufactured goods from Japan to Australia.	
02.08.1970:	Ownership, management and operation transferred to British India Steam Navigation Company Ltd, London after the E&A service was containerised. Renamed <i>Teesta</i> and transferred to BI's New Zealand/Gulf service.	
01.10.1971:	Management and operation transferred to P&O General Cargo Division.	
19.04.1973:	Ownership reverted to The Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company.	
07.07.1975:	Renamed Strathloyal.	
19.11.1977:	Sold to Jamal Enterprises Ltd, Pakistan, for \$558,000 for demolition at Gadani Beach.	
01.1978:	Work commenced.	
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
